## GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

**All exhibitors and participants shall read carefully the following rules and regulations as rules will be strictly enforced without deviation of any kind.**

1. The Washington County Fair Association reserves to its Executive Board the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions, and differences in regard thereto or otherwise arising out of, connected with, or incident to the Washington County Fair, and the right to amend or add to these rules as its judgment may determine. An exhibitor/participant who violates any of the general, division, show or special rules as published in this catalog will forfeit all privileges and premiums and be subject to such.
2. Special rules or conditions are published in each division where necessary. If there is a conflict between any special rules or conditions of any division and the general rules and regulations, the special rules or conditions will prevail.
3. **The Fair will officially open Saturday, September 10, 2011 at 6:00 p.m.** unless postponed by the Executive Board, which they hereby claim the right to do, either in part or whole, for cause whatsoever, for the general good of all concerned. The gates will open to visitors from 7:00 a.m. to 12 midnight. No one will be allowed in the commercial exhibition buildings after 10:00 p.m. other than those holding proper credentials.
4. The act of entering an animal in the Washington County Fair is the giving of verification by the exhibitor and parent/guardian that they have read the Washington County Fair Association Code of Show Ring Ethics and understand the consequences and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code.
5. Exhibits owned by 4-H or FFA Chapters may not be entered in the Junior Division of the Washington County Fair.
6. All entries shall be numbered by tag and/or label attached to such animals or articles before being received by the chairperson in charge of the respective department and will remain under his or her charge until the close of the Fair.
7. All exhibited articles must be called for within ten days after the Fair or they will be forfeited to the Washington County Fair.
8. During the Fair, no exhibits in any department will be allowed to be removed from the grounds without a permit. Permits can only be obtained from a show superintendent and/or committee chairperson(s). All livestock entries must remain in place throughout the Fair dates.
9. Premiums will be designated by a blue ribbon for first, red for second, white for third, etc.
10. Premiums will be paid on November 1. The Fair Association reserves the right to pay all premiums on a percentage basis of the net profit if enough money is not taken in during the Fair to pay the full amount as shown in this catalog.

11. Exhibitors will be required to keep their spaces in clean condition by removing waste and litter and placing same in designated areas where the cleanup crews may get to it with ease.
12. It shall be left to the discretion of the judges whether or not an exhibit is sufficiently up to standard of that class to be given first premium.
13. All attendees of the Washington County Fair are required to have gate tickets, either season or daily. Open beef cattle exhibitor's gate passes will be issued for vehicles of livestock exhibitors for convenience in hauling feed and supplies. Committee persons and exhibitors may park their vehicles in the north parking lot if space is available. The Washington County Fair Association assumes no liability for vehicles parked on the fairgrounds. All trailers must be removed from the fairgrounds and parked in designated trailer parking area. Gate/Parking Passes do not guarantee availability of parking.
14. Every effort will be made for the security of the exhibitors and others in attendance, but the Association will not be responsible for any loss or damage to articles or animals while on the grounds or in transit thereto from any cause whatsoever.
15. No claim for injury to any person or property shall ever be asserted, nor suit instituted or maintained against the Washington County Fair Association or its officers or agents, Washington County, Texas, by or on behalf of any person, firm or corporation, or their agents or representatives servants or employees, having license or privileges to exhibit on the fairgrounds or occupy space thereon.
16. The members of the press and directors, secretaries and fair queens of adjacent fairs are invited to attend our Fair and exhibitions. They are requested to make known their intentions to the Fair Secretary, who will send them the required tickets by mail.
17. The Fair Association reserves the right to use any Junior Livestock Division sale animal for the Livestock Judging Contest and any animal entered in the Dairy Show for the Dairy Judging Contest.
18. All protests must be in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$100.00, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal, and must be delivered to the management of the Washington County Fair Association immediately after the occasion for such protest. Protest will be accepted prior to judging or immediately at the conclusion of judging. Any protest of eligibility as to age or breeding of animals must be filed with management before judging. Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation. A decision may be withheld until a thorough investigation is complete, depending on the basis of the protest.

## CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock entered in any event at the Washington County Fair.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by fine example.

Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the Code of Ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and sale proceeds and may be prohibited from future participation in the Washington County Fair.

Exhibitors who violate this Code of Ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and will be reported to the Texas Association of Fairs and Exhibitions and other appropriate entities, which may result in an exhibitor being prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events.

1. All exhibitors must present upon request of fair and livestock officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide an animal health certificate from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or show officials, etc.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the Fair.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of volatile drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a show is giving consent by owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or absolutely responsible person for fair and show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood or other substances from the animal to be used for testing. Animals entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. No livestock shall be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. Any liquid or substance not considered part of an accepted and normal diet for livestock is deemed illegal and inhumane. For example: the use of alcoholic, carbonated, or caffeinated beverages or chocolate flavored nutritional supplements as drench or filler. Also prohibited is any other substance that may interfere with the residue testing procedure.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medications, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood or other substances tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory pertains to the sample

taken from animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainers, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

After animals arrive on the fairgrounds, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medication for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian, with the permission and supervision of the show chairperson.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or later its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal is prohibited.

6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices is not accepted and are prohibited.

7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. On the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect. No person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them. Protests may be made in accordance with Rule 18 of the General Rules and Regulations as printed in the Jr. Livestock Division rules.

8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person may conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or in action to violate this code of ethics. Violations of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition to the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of the code of ethics.

10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible persons to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or show for violation of the code of show ring ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or show without recourse against the fair.

11. The act of entering an animal in the fair is giving of certification by owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the Washington County Fair Association's Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

## **TEXAS ANIMAL HEALTH COMMISSION**

The complete Summary of Texas Requirements for Entry of Livestock (Domestic and Exotic), Poultry and Ratites into the State and into Shows, Fairs, Exhibitions, and Assemblies is found as an attachment at the back of this catalog.

The following is a condensed version of the Texas Animal Health Commissions regulations. The regulations will supersede this information and the summary if there is a dispute between the two.

### **JUNIOR LIVESTOCK DIVISION:**

**COLTS:** All colts must be EIA (coggins) tested within 12 months.

**COMMERCIAL HEIFERS:** Official health certificate within 30 days of entry.

1. Brucellosis test within 30 days is required of calfhooed vaccinated heifers that are over 18 months old. Official calfhooed vaccinated heifers that are parturient or post parturient are test eligible regardless of age.
2. Non-vaccinated heifers over 18 months must be tested within 30 days of show.

**BARROWS, CARCASS HOGS, COMMERCIAL STEERS, LAMBS, STEERS, AND WETHER GOATS:**  
One health certificate will be issued for each species covering all entries.

The above Guidelines are subject to change by the Texas Animal Health Commission.

## JUNIOR LIVESTOCK DIVISION RULES

1. All entries in this division are subject to the General Rules and Regulations published in this catalog, and to these Division Rules. In the event of a conflict between these Division Rules and the General Rules and Regulations, the provisions of these Division Rules shall prevail.
2. Participation in this division is limited to projects owned, fed, and cared for by Washington County 4-H or FFA members in good standing and under the supervision of the County Agents and Ag-Science Teachers.
3. 4-H & FFA members must be enrolled, attending, and in good standing with public or private elementary or secondary schools.
4. Junior Livestock Exhibitors who show in the Washington County Fair must live in Washington County or attend school in a Washington County School system the entire duration of the feeding period of their Junior Livestock project(s).
5. Junior Livestock Exhibitors suspended under the Texas Education Code 33.081 "No Pass, No Play" are ineligible to participate in any Washington County Fair activity, event or competition. Any animal entered in the Junior Livestock Division by an ineligible exhibitor is ineligible for competition.
6. Any youth that is interested in showing in the Washington County Fair must be nine (9) years of age or entering the third (3rd) grade in accordance with 4-H Rules. All third graders wanting to show in the Washington County Fair will need to note that some projects will need to be purchased while in the second (2nd) grade. Upon purchase and start of the project, these members will be required to attend the mandatory weigh-in/tag-in programs and educational programs relating to their projects.
7. 4 - H members must have joined a Washington County 4 - H Club by the ownership deadline of their Fair project and must attend 5 of their club meetings from October through July, except for 4 - H members who are joining 4 - H for the first time, regardless of age, who must attend 50% of their club meetings from the time they join a 4 - H club.
8. Exhibitors are required to meet attendance requirements of the club or chapter entered under.
9. 4-H/FFA members who have graduated from high school prior to the Fair are not eligible.
10. A Washington County 4-H/FFA member may participate in only one County Junior Livestock show in Texas during the current calendar year, January 1 to December 31.
11. There must be at least one animal per exhibitor to have a family tag-in.
12. Entry applications must be submitted on the current official Washington County Fair Association entry form in accordance with the instructions thereon. Project entry dates are as follows:

Entry fee to participate in the Junior Livestock Division will be \$25.00. That entry fee is to be paid at the FIRST division that the exhibitor enters. At any subsequent entry, an exhibitor will only need to complete the entry card and other paperwork necessary for that division. Included in the entry fee will be a complimentary season pass to the Washington County Fair. **(ENTRY FEES ARE NON- REFUNDABLE.)**

13. Release of Liability and Indemnity Agreement and Drug Certification Form must be signed by the exhibitor and parent/guardian for each species entered. No Junior Livestock Division entry will be allowed to show without this form being completed.

14. The act of entering an animal in the Junior Livestock Division is the giving of verification by the exhibitor and parent/guardian that they have read the Washington County Fair Association Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided by the actions prohibited by the code.

15. Undesirable and/or sifted (including under/over weight) animals will be removed from the Fair before judging. Each project's committee will have absolute authority in determining fitness of livestock and poultry to remain in the show and sale.

16. Only Washington County Fair, state validation, and government mandated ear tags will be allowed on any Junior Livestock Division project.

17. Exhibitors must be present to show their project, but if absent due to conflicting Fair events or illness, another Washington County 4-H or FFA Junior Livestock exhibitor may show their project provided the substitute showman has been approved by the respective committee chairperson before showing the project. Injury or medical conditions are considered on a case by case basis.

18. If an exhibitor brings two (2) or more exhibits to the Washington County Fair, the exhibitor must show the exhibits in all phases of their show, including their specified class and for alternate selections. Failure to comply will disqualify the exhibitor from the Junior Livestock Show and the Junior Livestock Sale.

19. 4-H/FFA members are responsible to care for (feed, water, etc.) all their projects during the Fair. Coops, pens, stalls, and aisle must be kept clean at all times. Failure to comply with this rule will result in projects removal from the show. If sold, the exhibitor's check will be withheld.

**20. The Junior Livestock Sale will be held Thursday, September 15, at 2:00 p.m.**

21. The Junior Livestock Sale will consist of 260 lots. All sale lots will be sold by the head or pen. Each project is being guaranteed the following number of sale lots:

47 Barrow	10 pens of Broilers	26 Steers
30 Carcass Hogs	11 Lambs	5 Turkeys
11 Colts	36 pens of Rabbits	27 Wether Goats

All remaining lots will be allocated on an equal percentage basis to be determined after all entries have arrived at the Fair and are duly qualified.

22. All barrows, broilers, lambs, rabbits, turkeys, steers and wether goats on the Junior Livestock Sale order will be terminal. A buyer's only choice of disposition of the animal will either be local slaughter or resale through the Washington County Fair. Animals which do not make the Junior Livestock Sale will be released on Sunday, September 18.

23. 4-H/FFA exhibitors can sell only one project in the Junior Livestock Sale.

24. All Grand and Reserve Champions must sell unless an exhibitor has shown more than one Grand or Reserve Champion. In this case, the Exhibitor may sell the Grand Champion of their choice or the Reserve Champion of their choice. Grand Champions must sell over Reserve Champions. All other qualified projects must sell.

25. Exhibitors having more than one project eligible to sell in the Junior Livestock Sale must sell their project that is first called for in the Sale Order.

26. To be eligible for a showmanship award in any division, an exhibitor must be a participating exhibitor in that division and show their own animal.

27. An exhibitor must own 100% of their project throughout the feeding period (family tag-in included), starting at the initial entry date. An exhibitor must feed and care for their project in Washington County on their facility or a facility approved by a majority of the specie committee members. An exhibitor leaving the county or the committee approved facility with their project during the feeding period must notify their respective committee chairperson. Violation of this rule will cause the exhibitor and project to be disqualified from the Junior Livestock Division. Division members will have the authority to inspect the exhibitor's project(s).

28. All exhibitors with sale entries are responsible for their livestock or poultry during the Sale. Exhibitors must be present when their entry is sold, but if not present, another exhibitor may show their sale entry. If absent because of illness or other legitimate excuse, a junior exhibitor may ask another 4H/FFA Washington County Fair Exhibitor to handle the sale order entry. The exhibitor must notify and obtain permission from their committee chairperson of the substitution. If the seller has not obtained permission and has no excuse for his/her absence deemed valid by a majority of the Junior Livestock Division chairpersons, his/her Sale entry will be subject to an additional 25% penalty. The amount of that penalty will be forwarded to the Washington County Fair Scholarship Fund.

**29. ALL SALES ARE FINAL**

30. A 6% commission will be retained by the Fair's Junior Livestock Division on all Junior Livestock Auction sales.

31. Ear tags and wing bands must be left in place. Removal is prohibited.
32. Decorations of Junior Livestock Sale animals or commercial heifers for the auction are prohibited. Animals must be presented for auction in their natural show state.
33. The Junior Livestock Division is designed to be educational and beneficial to its exhibitors. Any Exhibitor or their Parent/Guardian not adhering to the General, Jr. Livestock, or Division Rules may ban that Exhibitor from participating in the Washington County Fair for a time determined by the Executive Board.
34. Following the Fair, a note will be sent to all Junior Livestock Division exhibitors listing their buyers and add-on contributors, along with their name, address and phone number, sale/add-on amount. **All Junior Livestock exhibitors must write Thank You Letters to their buyers, add-on contributors and award sponsors.** The Thank You letters must be submitted to the Fair Office in a pre-stamped envelope, complete with buyer's name and address, and exhibitor's name and return address for approval by October 7 no later than 4:30 p.m. **Letters received after that time through October 14<sup>th</sup> (One Week) will be assessed a 1% penalty on the Sale Price of their project(s). Letters received after October 14<sup>th</sup> will be assessed an additional 1% per day on the Sale Price of their project(s) until the letter is received.** All checks will be mailed November 1, provided thank you letters to buyers and sponsors were submitted to the Fair Office. If drug results are pending on tested animals, those checks will be held until all drug results are complete. Buyer's Banquet will be held Monday, October 17, 2011.
35. All County Agricultural Agents and Ag-Science Teachers serve as advisory members to all committees in the Junior Livestock Division.
36. Drug Certification Agreement: Exhibitor and Parent/Guardian certify that the entry has not been administered, or that the Exhibitor and Parent/Guardian has any knowledge that this entry has received, any substance not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and/or the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) for food animals. Furthermore, the Exhibitor and Parent/Guardian certifies that this entry is not, nor will be, within any withdrawal time relative to the administration of any drug, chemical, or feed additive by the FDA and/or the USDA by the time the animal(s) is officially weighed or checked in by the show.
37. a) Random drug testing may be conducted, with entries to be tested being selected under the direction of the Washington County Fair Association Executive Board on the day of the shows.
- b) Emergency Treatment: If an animal requires emergency treatment while on show grounds, only a licensed veterinarian will be allowed to administer any drug, chemical, or feed additive. The Chairperson(s) of that committee must be notified.
- c) Treated Animals: Should an animal(s) which has been sold in the Jr. Livestock Sale require a withdrawal period, the Washington County Fair (WCF) will care for the animal for the duration of the withdrawal period with a charge to the exhibitor for the care. The exhibitor hereby releases the show from any damage, which might arise out of such feeding.
38. Disclaimer of Warranties: The WCF expressly disclaims any expressed or implied warranties (including merchantability), whether the goods or service are provided by the WCF or by others (such as drug testing). The WCF does not provide security or guard services and is not responsible for the acts of third parties. Exhibitors and exhibitor's parents/guardians agree that the WCF shall be entitled to disqualify any exhibitor whose animal(s) tests positive for any

drug even if the exhibitor and the exhibitor's parents/guardians are innocent of any wrong doing and had no role in the administration of the drug shown by the drug test. Even if the source of the drug is unknown, the WCF shall be entitled to disqualify the exhibitor. Disqualification results in forfeiture of all auction proceeds.

39. Disqualification: The show reserves the right to disqualify any animal found in violation of the use of drugs, chemicals, or feed additives and the exhibitor will forfeit all auction sale money if the animal is disqualified. If an animal(s) is disqualified for testing positive, the class will not change. An exhibitor of an animal testing positive for any drug or medication or unapproved chemical may forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit in the future at the show.

40. The showing of unethically fitted livestock is prohibited. Unethical fitting means any physical or physiological attempt to alter the natural conformation, musculature, or weight of an animal by use of injections or ingested material not conducive to the continued health or marketability of its carcass. No change in the major color pattern of an animal by painting or dyeing will be allowed.

41. The act of filling animals internally, which would include stomach pumping, drench tubes or any other method (per as by esophagus) is prohibited.

42. If an exhibitor, parent/guardian of an exhibitor, or their representative interferes with the judges, committee members, or the show, the Fair Management may exclude the Exhibitor, Parent/Guardian, Family or Representative from participation in any or all events at the Fair for a period of time deemed appropriate for the offense. Management may withhold sale money or take any other steps deemed desirable. **All Judge and Classifier decisions are final.**

1. All barrow entries are subject to the General Rules and Regulations and the Junior Livestock Division rules except where they conflict with the rules of this show, in which case, the Show Rules prevail.
2. Only barrows are eligible and must be identified by Washington County Fair Association ear tags, and be on feed and ear tagged on June 9 from 6:00 to 7:30 p.m.

Exhibitor may tag in three (3) barrows, or a family may tag three (3) barrows per exhibitor. They do not need to specify which barrow belongs to which exhibitor at tag-in. All barrows must be tagged at the fairgrounds and will remain on trailers for ear tagging. If barrow loses an ear tag, exhibitor must notify the Fair Office within seven days.

3. Each exhibitor can enter only one (1) barrow in the show. The barrow must be specified to an exhibitor before they are weighed in at the show and will not be changed under any circumstances.
4. Tentative dates have been set for two educational programs. Exhibitors must attend at least one of these programs to be eligible to participate in the Junior Barrow Show.

Tentative dates are: May 1- 7:00 P.M., and  
June 12 – 7:00 P.M.

(Exhibitors will be required to sign in and out at all programs). Anyone arriving at programs later than 10 minutes after scheduled starting time will be marked absent.

3. Meat pen rabbits must be raised from pedigreed stock of the same breed.
4. Breeding and ownership dates for meat pens are as follows:

June 1 - Deadline for owning breeding stock, for first time breeders, if shown in Bred & Owned Class

June 1 - Breeding date for 2011 Washington County Fair

August 7 - Ownership deadline for rabbits shown in Purchased Class

### 5. MEAT CLASSES:

a) All ARBA disqualifications and eliminations and those printed herein apply to each meat pen. Exceptions: Body smut of Californian (Himalayan marked) animals. Non-descended testicle(s) on bucks

b) All ARBA general faults printed herein apply to each pen. Meat pens will consist of three rabbits (all the same breed and variety)

c) Pens will be eliminated if more than one breed or variety is in the same pen. It is not necessary that rabbits be from the same litter, with age limit not over 75 days

d) Weight Limits: Rabbits cannot weigh over 2 3/4 pounds at time of tag-in and not over 5 pounds at sift. Rabbits must be weighed in the presence of the judge/committee.

6. Exhibitor cannot validate more than 15 rabbits or a family cannot validate more than 15 rabbits per exhibitor. Exhibitors in a family do not need to specify which rabbits belong to which exhibitor at validation.
7. Exhibitor is limited to one pen of three rabbits, either sex. Exhibitor may bring three extra rabbits at time of sifting and may substitute for any disqualified rabbit or use these to substitute for the entire pen of three.
8. Rabbits will be sifted Tuesday, September 13 by ARBA show judge, registrar or committee designee. Rabbit entries must be signed in between 6:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. Sift will begin promptly at 6:30 p.m.
9. Rabbit entries will be brought to and from the show table by the exhibitor or any youth in good standing with 4-H/FFA.
10. Rabbits will be judged in two (2) classes. Grand and Reserve Champion Pens will be selected from the top two pens in each class.

Class 1: Bred & Owned – In this class, **you must own your breeding does year around** and take care of them year around. You are allowed to have your does bred by another person's buck. Any new breeding stock must be owned by the deadline for this Class. You may also keep your breeding stock at another location if approved by the Committee or Committee designee, provided they are under the exhibitor's care.

Class 2: Purchased – In this division, you must purchase and take possession of any stock you plan to show in this division and must be done by the deadline for this Class as printed in the fair catalog annually. You are not required to keep this stock year around.

12. Allocation of sale lots for Junior Livestock Sale:

a) Bred & Owned Class will receive 65% of the eligible sale lots

b) Purchased Class will receive 35% of the eligible sale lots. If all sale lots allotted to a class are not used by that class, the remaining sale lots will be added to the other class.

13. Exhibitor is responsible for feeding, watering and caring for their rabbits during the Fair. Exhibitor must furnish their own feed. There will be no containers of feed in or on top of cages. (Waterers/feeders will be furnished by the Fair Association). A cleanup committee will be responsible for cleaning rabbit area, although each exhibitor is responsible for the cage area in which their rabbits are.

14. All non-sale rabbits will be released Saturday, September 17, 10:00 p.m. - Midnight and Sunday, September 18, 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. Rabbits must be signed out with a committee member prior to leaving the fairgrounds. Rabbits still in pens after 9:00 a.m. will be donated to the Fair.

15. Rabbits sold in the Junior Livestock Sale will be dressed under the direction of the Rabbit Committee. Exhibitor must pick up rabbits from the Fairgrounds Monday, September 26, 5:00 to 5:45 pm. Delivery to buyer must be made by Tuesday, September 27.

2. This show is open to all youth of Washington County 6 years of age and under 19 years of age as of September 1, 2011.
3. Entries will be accepted Wednesday September 14, 8:00 a.m.
4. The show is open only to recognized breeds of pedigreed purebred rabbits. Mixed breeds will not be permitted to enter the show.
5. All stock must be clearly marked and permanently earmarked in the left ear. All stock must be bona fide property of the exhibitor.
6. Entry into the show may be refused for the following reasons: colds, ear canker, open sores, sore hocks, and any other obvious illness; at the discretion of the superintendent and/or judges. Removal of these animals will be immediate.
7. The Washington County Fair Association will not be responsible for any loss or damage in the showroom or on the grounds but will try to provide every precaution necessary to safeguard the animals.
8. Ribbons will be awarded to the first 5 places in each class.
9. Trophies will be awarded to the following:
  - Best in Show
  - Best of Opposite Sexes in Show
  - Best of Breed
  - Best of Opposite Sex of Breed

1. All steer entries will be subject to the General Rules and Regulations and the Junior Livestock Division Rules, except where they conflict with the rules of the show, in which case, the show rules will prevail.

2. Exhibitor may tag in three (3) steers, or a family may tag three (3) steers per exhibitor. There must be a minimum of one (1) steer per exhibitor in a family tag-in. Exhibitor may enter only one (1) steer in the show. In a family tag-in, a steer must be specified to an exhibitor before it crosses the weigh scale at the weigh-in, Tuesday, September 13 from 5:00 to 6:00 p.m.

3. There will be two steer divisions: a) American (shows Brahman influence)  
b) European (purebred or cross bred of all other breed influences)

4. Initial weigh-in for all steers will be Thursday, March 24, 6:00 to 7:00 PM at the fairgrounds. Out of county officials will classify steers one time. **All classifier decisions are final.**

5. Steers will be weighed, ear tagged, and nose printed. If ear tag is lost during the feeding period, the steer will be re-nose printed and given a new ear tag. If nose print does not match the initial nose print, the steer will be disqualified.

6. Steers cannot be added or switched after the initial weigh-in date.

7. All steers must attend the initial weigh-in on March 24. All exhibitors and steers must attend the last weigh-in/program on August 14, and one of the two remaining programs ( May 11 or June 8) to be eligible to show at the fair. March 24 Initial Weigh-in & Orientation

May 11 Feeding & Health

June 8 Showmanship & Grooming

Aug. 14 Final Weigh - In at 4:00 p.m. and Pre-Showmanship Contest

**First three weigh-ins to be held 6:00 to 7:00 P.M. Program to follow at 7:00 P.M.**

8. Steers that weigh under the minimum of 1,000 lbs. and over the maximum of 1, 500 lbs. will be removed from the scale, scale balanced, and the steer will be immediately re-weighed one time. Steers not making the weight requirements must be removed from the grounds Tuesday, September 13. Steers making the required weight must be shown unless a steer is deemed unruly by the committee. All decisions and weights will be final.

9. Steers will be divided equitably into classes according to weights. If twelve or more steers are weighed into a division Tuesday, September 13, there will be a middle weight class added to that division.

10. Steers must be clipped to have no more than  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch of hair on any part of the steer's body upon arrival at the fairgrounds. The only exception will be the tail switch. The switch may be ratted and balled or bobbed off. Steers will be checked at the time of weigh-in for conformity of the  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch or less of hair. No clipping on the steers (electrical or manual) will be allowed once the steers are on the fairgrounds. Steers found in violation of this rule will be eliminated from the competition and removed from the grounds.

11. The showing of unethically fitted livestock is prohibited. Unethical fitting means any physical or physiological attempt to alter the natural configuration, musculature, or weight of an animal by use of injections or ingested materials not conducive to the continued health of the animal or marketability of its carcass. No change in the major color pattern of an animal by painting or dyeing will be allowed.

12. The act of artificially filling animals internally, which would include stomach pumping drench tubes, or any other method (per as by esophagus) is prohibited.

13. There will be 5% weigh back. After the judging of each class is completed, all 1st and 2nd placing steers will be weighed immediately after leaving the arena (3rd place steers will be weighed only if the 1st or 2nd place steer weighs out). Any steer weighing more than 5% of the show weight will be disqualified. Qualified steers after the weigh back will advance in placing if the steer(s) previously placed higher has been disqualified. Only the exhibitor or immediate family member may lead a steer to the scale.

14. The following show barn rules must be followed:

\*Stalls, aisles, feed and tack areas must be kept clean at all times.

\*Trimming chutes, feed and tack will be allowed in areas designated by steer committee.

\*No box fans or port-a-cool fans.

\*Steers must remain in their assigned stalls at all times.

\*Electrical cords in the aisles must be buried for safety.

1. Wether Goat entries will be subject to the General Rules and Regulations and the Jr. Livestock Division Rules, except where they conflict with the rules of this show, in which case, the Show Rules prevail.

2. Wether Goats will be ear tagged, tattooed and weighed on June 7 from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. at the fairgrounds. The following criteria will be followed:

a) Male goats must be castrated, dehorned and/or disbudded before June 7.

b) Exhibitor may tag three (3) wethers or a family may tag three (3) per exhibitor (for a family tag-in, you do not have to specify which goat(s) belong to which exhibitor at weigh-in. However, there must be at least one wether tagged in for each exhibitor.) Each exhibitor can enter only one (1) wether in the show. A wether must be specified to an exhibitor before they are weighed in at the final weigh-in, Tuesday September 13. One wether per exhibitor can be brought to the final weigh-in. An exhibitor may substitute another tagged wether if their wether was disqualified due to weight.

3. Exhibitors must attend at least one (1) of the three educational program meetings to be eligible to show. **Tag-in does not count as an educational meeting.** Exhibitors will be required to sign in at all programs. Sign-in sheets will be removed 10 minutes after the scheduled start time. Programs will be presented on the following dates:

b) Wethers must have hair clipped and must be clean upon arrival. No clipping allowed on Fairgrounds.

c) Horn regrowth (i.e. scurs) cannot be longer than 1.5 inches at time of final weigh-in at the Fair. If horn regrowth is longer, animal will be disqualified.

d) Wether goats will be divided into five equal classes with a minimum weight of 75 lbs. and a maximum weight of 115 lbs. being allowed. A two lb. tolerance is allowed.

e) All covers, halters, ear tags, (except Washington County Fair ear tags and the TAHC/USDA scrapie ear tags) or any other item containing any form of identification must be removed prior to the September 13 weigh-in and continue throughout the Fair.

5. Awards: Buckles will be awarded for each 1st Place in Class. Ribbons awarded 1st thru 10th place. Showmanship ribbons awarded 1st thru 3rd place.

This project is a part of the Junior Livestock Division; however, 4-H & FFA members can show and sell in this program as well as in the Junior Livestock Sale. (Example: You can sell commercial heifers in addition to a barrow, carcass hog, colt, fryers, lamb, rabbits, steer, turkey, or wether goat). Exhibitors must abide by the General and Junior Livestock Division Rules.

1. This show is limited to projects owned, fed, and cared for by Washington County 4-H & FFA members in good standing and under the supervision of the Ag-Science Teachers and County Extension Agents. 4-H members must be nine (9) years of age or entering the 3rd grade in accordance with 4-H Rules to be eligible to participate and must abide by all Fair rules, attendance, etc.

2. Crossbred heifers are desired but purebred heifers will be permitted to show. Any heifer exhibited in the Commercial Heifer Show will not be allowed to compete in the Washington County Fair Junior Beef Heifer Show. Note: Heifers must be dehorned in order to exhibit. No grooming except for clipping of head, ears, tail and belly will be allowed.

3. Entry deadline is February 20. Paper work checked in from 4:30 to 5:30 pm., followed by meeting at 5:30. Due at this time are: Bangs Vaccination Sheets, Breeder Validation Sheets, entry fee, Exhibitor Information Sheet, and Release of Liability & Indemnity, and Drug Certification Form. Heifers entered on February 20 will be tagged and **tattooed** at assigned time Saturday, March 26, at Brenham Livestock Auction Barn. No heifers will be permitted at tag-in before their assigned time. Any attempt at early tag-in will automatically force the affected heifers to remain on the trailer and be moved to the end of the line (after 4:00 pm.) NOTE: No heifers will be accepted for tag-in if appropriate paperwork was not turned in at the February 20 meeting.

4. *Heifers must be Brucellosis calfhood vaccinated by February 20.* Heifers must have a metal calfhood vaccination tag in their ear and this must correspond with paperwork. No heifer having RV9 or earlier vaccination tattoos will be allowed to show in the spring born class.

5. The following age heifers will be eligible to show:

1. Halter heifers born January 1 - March 31, 2010
2. Halter heifers born October 1 - December 31, 2009

3. Pen of 3 non-haltered heifers born October 1, 2009 - March 31, 2010

6. Heifers checked at the tag-in must have milk teeth, with no permanent incisors in view. Heifers not meeting this criteria will be disqualified from the program.

7. Exhibitors may tag in two (2) heifers or a family may tag in two (2) heifers per exhibitor. There must be a minimum of one (1) heifer per exhibitor in a family tag in. Exhibitors may enter two (2) heifers for competition in the halter classes as long as both heifers are not exhibited in the same class (one heifer must be spring and one heifer must be fall born). In a family tag in, heifers must be specified to an exhibitor on the breeding sheets turned in at the Livestock Entry Gate. Once the breeding sheets have been turned in upon entry to the fairgrounds, no changes will be made under any circumstances or exhibitors may tag in and exhibit a pen of three (3) heifers. NOTE: In a pen of three competition, 3 head must be tagged, but if a heifer is unable to compete, the remaining eligible heifers will be able to sell in the Sale but will not be eligible to compete for prize money. A pen of 2 can compete for record book and stall awards. A pen of one (1) heifer will be disqualified and not be eligible to compete at the Fair in any area of the Commercial Heifer Division.

8. Heifers cannot be added after the February 20 entry deadline. Halter heifers may be switched among exhibitors in the same family provided a family tag-in was done. No switching of halter heifers will be allowed after the breeding sheets are turned in at the Livestock Entry Gate. Pen heifers cannot be switched after the February 20 entry deadline

9. Exhibitors must own heifer(s) 100% throughout feeding period starting on February 20. Exhibitor must feed and care for heifer(s) in Washington County on their facility, or other committee approved facility and exhibit heifer(s) without any aid or assistance other than that of immediate family, Washington County Extension Agents, Ag-Science Teachers, and/or 4 -H Adult Leaders. Violations will cause the exhibitor to forfeit all rights to compete in the commercial heifer show.

10. Halter heifer entries must be halter broken by the August summer clinics and be led into the show ring by the exhibitor at that time to be eligible to compete.

11. Exhibitors must attend and participate in 1 of 2 Showmanship and Record Book Clinics to be eligible to show at the Fair. Tag-in and Program dates are as follows:

12. Heifers must comply with Texas Animal Health Commission rules governing entry into the Washington County Fair. Check with your veterinarian for regulations concerning stock shows and sales before the Fair that would pertain to out-of-state shipments. Heifers must be palpated and at least 60 days pregnant, but not calved by show time as stated on official health papers after inspection by a licensed veterinarian. Please have veterinarian state the trimester pregnancy is in and brucellosis test results on health paper. (No earlier than 14 days prior to the Fair). **Palpation must be done between August 31 and September 3. Heifers not palpated by September 3 will not be allowed to participate.**

13. Heifers will be checked in for the Fair, September 13 from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. at the livestock gate. Health papers and breeding sheets will be collected at the gate. Hip heights on halter heifers will be taken as heifers are unloaded at the Fair.

14. Pen heifers will be judged Wednesday, September 14, 9:00 a.m. Record books will be judged with interviews following pen heifer results and awards. Halter heifers will be judged Thursday, September 15, 8:00 a.m. Halter heifers getting away from an exhibitor more than 2 times during the show will be tied to the fence. Showmanship will be judged during the halter heifer show.

15. Only exhibitors, heifers, and committee members are allowed in the show ring during the show. Any other person in the ring will disqualify the exhibitor and heifer associated with that person from the show and sale.

16. Classes will consist of the following: (Pen heifers are classified into their division at the initial tag-in on March 26. Pen of 3 unaltered heifers born October 1, 2009 - March 31, 2010 from the following divisions:

1. Commercial Steer entries will be subject to the General Rules and Regulations and the Jr. Livestock Division Rules except where they conflict with the rules of the show, in which case, Show Rules will prevail.
2. Commercial steers Initial Weigh In will be on April 9. Steers will be weighed and ear tagged at that time. If ear tag is lost during the feeding period, the exhibitor must notify the Chairman within seven (7) days of loss and will be given a new ear tag.
3. Steers of any beef breeds are eligible to be entered in this show. Exhibitor must have owned their steers prior to April 9. Steers must be fed and cared for by the exhibitor from the date of acquisition to the closing day of the Fair.
4. Entry of one pen per exhibitor will be accepted. It will be a pen of two steers and they are to be fed in a separate feed pen from other livestock when placed on full feed. NOTE: Steers may be grazed prior to entering the show with other livestock. Replacement steers will not be accepted.
5. Exhibitor, parent/guardian, and a Committee Officer will be required to sign the record book kept on the pen of steers.
6. Steers must weigh 1050 lbs. or more at the final weigh-in, (before shrink). There will be no re-weighs. Steers should have been fed a minimum of 154 days. Steers weighing less than 1050 lbs. at the official weigh-in will not be placed and will not receive grade points. Light steers will sell last unless the exhibitor places Grand and/or Reserve Champion. The participant will be eligible for point money. If a steer should die or become ineligible during the feeding period, the exhibitor may show and sell the remaining steer. If an exhibitor should have a steer die during the Feeding Program, the Record Book would be completed as follows: All costs incurred by the exhibitor from the initial weigh – in date until the date the steer died would be divided by two and the remaining days would only show cost for the remaining steer.
7. Steers will be weighed at a designated time and place, with a 3% shrink, and will be sold at that same weight.
8. Steers need not be halter broken; however, no wild or unruly animals will be accepted. (If it is necessary to remove one or both unruly steers from a pen, the pen will be disqualified) They will be shown as a group of pens. Rule will be enforced.
9. Steers must be dehorned (Not tipped.), otherwise they will not be accepted in the show.
10. Each exhibitor must certify that these steers were legally withdrawn from all chemicals and drugs in accordance with United States Food and Drug Administration regulations and comply with all state and federal regulations pertaining to livestock.
11. All steers will be ear tagged on April 9.
12. Exhibitors must complete all phases of the contest in order to sell their steers and receive premium monies.
13. A committee of judges will grade the Junior Commercial Steers based on U.S.D.A. Standard Quality and yield grades for slaughter steers.
14. Steers receiving ribbons will be sold in overall high point order at auction. Steers that grade below the grade of Select or that weigh less than 1050 lbs., will be sold at auction after all other

steers of a higher grade are sold. Steers entered will be sold at auction. A 5% sales fee will be deducted from market price. A market price will be determined by the resale bid on the day of the sale and will be announced. Money bid over this market price will not go to the exhibitor, but will be added to the point money award system.

15. The official scoring system used in this division based on 100 points will be scored as follows:

- Quiz- 25 pts.
- Feed Conversation - 5 pts.
- Steer Grade- 10 Pts.
- Record Book- 25 pts.
- Oral Interview- 25 pts.
- Cost/lb of Gain- 5 pts.
- Average Daily Gain- 5 pts.

16. Chairperson will designate a time and place when record books are to be turned in when steers are unloaded at the fair.

**Summary of Texas Requirements**

**For Entry of Livestock (Domestic and Exotic), Poultry and Ratites into the State and into Shows, Fairs, Exhibitions, and Assemblies**

**Note:** The following summary is a condensed version of the Texas Animal Health Commission regulations. The regulations will supersede this summary if there is a dispute between the two.

**1. Infected, Exposed or Quarantined for Disease**

Any livestock, poultry or ratites that are infected, exposed or quarantined in any manner for an infectious, contagious or communicable disease may not enter the state unless:

- A. They are consigned direct to slaughter or to an approved feedyard/pen or directly from the premise of origin to a specifically approved market for sale to slaughter or an approved feedyard/pen accompanied by a VS 1-27 permit (Swine that are infected or exposed to PRV may be moved from out of state only directly to a slaughter plant in Texas.); or,
- B. If quarantined as a result of Commission action may enter only as specified in the quarantine order established by the Commission; or,
- C. Given written permission by the Executive Director of the Commission for each movement.

NOTE: "Brushy-tailed possums cannot be transported into the State."

**2. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection**

The certificate must indicate that the accredited veterinarian found the animals or fowl to be free of symptoms or evidence of communicable disease and that all tests, immunizations or treatments, required by the Commission, were completed. For certain diseases, a specific statement may be required indicating disease free status. The certificate is required to accompany animals and fowl entering the State of Texas as stated in the following summary of entry requirements. The certificate is valid for 45 days for equine and 30 days for all other species.

**3. Waybill**

The waybill may be used in lieu of a certificate of veterinary inspection to accompany:

- A. Cattle, 18 months of age and over, delivered directly from a farm of origin consigned to slaughter.
- B. Beef breed cattle, 18 months of age and over, entering from other than a farm-of-origin may be moved to slaughter, or to an approved feedyard/pen when accompanied by a Form VS 1-27 on which each animal is individually identified. Brucellosis test data shall be written on the VS 1-27 form which must include the test date and results (when required).
- C. Beef breed cattle, 18 months of age and over, delivered directly to a USDA specifically approved livestock market by the owner or consigned there and accompanied by a waybill.
- D. Beef breed steers, spayed heifers and beef cattle under 18 months of age, consigned to slaughter or a livestock market.
- E. Beef breed steers, spayed heifers and beef cattle under 18 months of age delivered to an approved feedyard for feeding for slaughter by the owner or consigned there and accompanied by a waybill.
- F. Swine consigned to slaughter.
- G. Poultry consigned to a slaughter establishment that maintains federal postmortem inspection.

The waybill must contain the name and address of the owner or shipper; point of origin; number and type of livestock and/or poultry; purpose of movement; official identification (when required); and destination.

**4. Prior Entry Permit**

Entry permits are required as noted in the following summary of entry requirements. Permits may be obtained by calling 512/719-0777 (24 hours) or 1/800-550-8242, or by writing the Texas Animal Health Commission, 2105 Kramer Lane, P. O. Box 12966, Austin, Texas 78711-2966.

**5. Entering Shows, Fairs, Exhibitions, and Assemblies**

A. Livestock, poultry and ratites entering from out of state must meet this state's entry requirements. Texas origin dairy cattle are not required to test for tuberculosis to participate in a show, fair or exhibition within the state but they must be individually identified.

B. Animals moving from out of state and entering for exhibition and sale must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection and a permit for entry when required by the entry regulations. The permit for entry is not required when livestock enter for exhibition and return to the state of origin. Permit is required for bulls: See #6. Cattle Entering the State from Other States; C. Trichomoniasis Requirements; (2).

C. Poultry entered in terminal public exhibition events shall be accompanied by a certificate of source which identifies the flock of origin. Poultry entering in a non-terminal public exhibition shall be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection. The certificate of veterinary inspection shall state that poultry have been inspected and are free from evidence of infectious or contagious diseases; that the poultry have been vaccinated only with approved vaccines, and poultry have not originated from an area that has had an active avian disease within 30 days of entry. Poultry entering the state for public exhibition, from other states, must have either a negative flock or individual bird test for Avian Influenza, within 30 days of entry and the results of such test shall be recorded on the certificate of veterinary inspection. A negative pullorum-typhoid test is required within 30 days prior to entry or poultry must originate from flocks that meet either the Texas Pullorum-Typhoid Program and/or the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP).

D. Equine may enter Texas for shows, fairs, exhibitions, or assembly purposes when accompanied by a valid equine interstate passport or equine identification card and a completed VS Form 10-11 showing negative results to an official EIA test within the previous 6 months or a certificate of veterinary inspection and a completed VS Form 10-11 showing negative results to an official EIA test with the previous 12 months.

E. Equine originating in Texas and:

(1) Entering parimutuel racetracks - Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection and a negative test for EIA conducted within 12 months. Foals, under 8 months of age, nursing a negative dam are exempt from testing.

(2) Entering a show, fair, exhibition, and assembly - Must have a negative test for EIA conducted within the previous 12 months. Foals, under 8 months of age, nursing a negative dam are exempt from testing.

F. All other livestock, poultry and ratites originating in Texas and:

(1) Entering interstate shows, fairs, and exhibitions (those functions that permit livestock and poultry from other states to enter for show or exhibition and held in common facilities with Texas origin livestock and poultry of the same species) - Are exempt from an entry permit, except poultry, but must meet the same other requirements as for those entering from out-of-state and be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection.

a. Ratites must be individually identified with either an RFID device, a permanently attached tag or an implanted electronic device (microchip) and tested negative for Avian Influenza and Salmonella pullorum-typhoid within 30 days of entry.

b. Swine entered in terminal shows are exempt from brucellosis, leptospirosis and pseudorabies requirements.

c. Breeding rams originating in Texas are exempt from the brucella ovis test.

d. Vaccination for brucellosis is not required for cattle.

e. Texas origin dairy cattle are not required to test for tuberculosis to participate in a show, fair or exhibition within the state but must be individually identified.

(2) Entering all intrastate shows, fairs, and exhibitions (those functions that require Texas livestock, poultry and ratites of the same species to be housed and exhibited separate and apart from livestock, poultry and ratites from out of state) - Are exempt from the certificate of veterinary inspection and testing requirements, except;

a. poultry must originate from flocks or hatcheries free of pullorum disease and fowl typhoid or have a negative pullorum-typhoid test within 30 days before exhibition.

b. all exhibition sheep and goats must have a scrapie identification eartag except registered goats with a registration tattoo and accompanied by registration papers listing the scrapie premise ID number.

G. Rodeo stock from Mexico shall be tested for tuberculosis by an accredited US veterinarian within 12 months prior to their utilization as rodeo or roping stock, and retested for tuberculosis every

12 months thereafter. This is in addition to the entry requirements set out in the section "Cattle Entering the State from Foreign Countries".

## **6. Cattle Entering the State from Other States**

A certificate of veterinary inspection and entry permit is required on sexually intact cattle, 18 months of age and older, except those entering from Class "Free" or "A" states or certified free herds.

### **A. Brucellosis Requirements**

Test eligible cattle are defined as all cattle that are parturient, post parturient or 18 months of age and over (as evidenced by the loss of the first pair of temporary incisor teeth). Test eligible cattle, except steers and spayed heifers, being shipped to an approved feedyard/pen prior to slaughter shall be officially individually identified with a permanent identification device prior to leaving the state of origin.

#### **(1) Vaccination**

All non-vaccinated female cattle between 4 and 12 months of age shall be officially vaccinated prior to entry. Exceptions to these vaccination requirements:

- a. Female cattle entering for purposes of shows, fairs and exhibitions and returning to their original location.
- b. Female cattle moving within brucellosis commuter herds.
- c. Spayed heifers.
- d. Female cattle from brucellosis free states.
- e. Female cattle, between 4 and 12 months of age, from other than free states shall be vaccinated as follows:

(i) Entering from an out-of state farm of origin will be accompanied by a waybill to a Texas market, approved feedyard for feeding for slaughter or direct to slaughter. These cattle may be vaccinated at a market at no expense to the state prior to leaving the market and be moved freely. If these cattle are not vaccinated at the market then they shall be consigned from the market only to an approved feedyard for feeding for slaughter or direct to slaughter, accompanied by an "S" permit. If consigned to an approved feedyard, they shall also be "F" branded high on the tail-head prior to or upon entering the feedyard.

(ii) Entering from an out-of-state livestock market to a Texas livestock market, an approved feedyard for feeding for slaughter or direct to slaughter will be accompanied by an "S" brand permit or certificate of veterinary inspection. These cattle may be vaccinated, at no expense to the state, prior to leaving the market and be moved freely. If these cattle are not vaccinated at the market, then they shall be consigned from the market only to an approved feedyard for feeding for slaughter or direct to slaughter, accompanied by an "S" permit. If consigned to an approved feedyard, they shall also be "F" branded high on the tail-head prior to or upon entering the feedyard.

(iii) Entering from any out-of-state location and destined for a Texas premise, may enter on a calfhood vaccination permit and must be vaccinated, at no expense to the state, within 14 days after arriving at the premise of destination.

#### **(2) Testing**

All test eligible, non-quarantined cattle

a. shall be moved directly from:

- (i) a class free state or area; or
- (ii) a certified free herd; or
- (iii) a commuter herd; or

b. cattle not from class free states or areas, certified brucellosis free herds, or commuter herd shall be "S" branded and moved directly to an approved feedyard/pen or to slaughter, accompanied with an "S" permit or moved directly from a farm of origin to a USDA specifically approved livestock market to be "S" branded and moved directly to an approved feedyard/pen or to slaughter accompanied with an "S" permit; or

c shall be tested negative one or more times as described in this subparagraph:

(i) cattle from a Class "A" state or area shall:

(I) be tested negative within 30 days prior to entry; or

(II) be moved directly from a farm of origin to a USDA specifically approved livestock market for a negative test prior to sale;

(ii) cattle from a class "B" state or area shall:

- (I) be tested negative within 30 days prior to entry, accompanied with an "E" permit, and held under quarantine for a negative retest 45-120 days at a farm, ranch, or feedyard; or
- (II) be moved directly from a farm of origin to a USDA specifically approved livestock market for a negative test and held under quarantine for a negative retest 45-120 days after sale to a farm, ranch or feedyard.

#### B. Tuberculosis Requirements

(1) All beef cattle, bison and sexually neutered dairy cattle originating from a tuberculosis free state or zone, or from a tuberculosis accredited herd are exempt from tuberculosis testing requirements.

(2) All beef cattle, bison and sexually neutered dairy cattle originating from a state or zone with anything less than a tuberculosis free state shall be tested negative for tuberculosis in accordance with the appropriate status requirements as contained in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Part 77, Sections 77.10 through 77.19. If tuberculosis testing is required, the test should be conducted within 60 days prior to entry with results of this test recorded on the certificate of veterinary inspection.

(3) All dairy breed animals, including steers and spayed heifers, shall be officially identified prior to entry into the state.

(4) All sexually intact dairy cattle, that are two (2) months of age or older may enter provided that they are officially identified, and are accompanied by a certificate stating that they were negative to an official tuberculosis test conducted within 60 days prior to the date of entry.

(5) All sexually intact dairy cattle that are less than two (2) months of age must be officially identified and obtain an entry permit from the Commission to a designated facility where the animals will be held until they are tested negative at the age of two (2) months.

(6) Animals which originate from a tuberculosis accredited herd and/or animals moving directly to an approved slaughtering establishment are exempt from the test requirement.

(7) Dairy cattle delivered to an approved feedyard/pen for feeding for slaughter by the owner or consigned there and accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection with an entry permit issued by the commission are exempt from testing unless from a restricted herd but must be officially identified.

(8) In addition, all sexually intact dairy cattle originating from a state or zone with anything less than a tuberculosis free state status shall be tested negative for tuberculosis in accordance with the appropriate requirements for states or zones for that status, prior to entry with results of the test recorded on the certificate of veterinary inspection.

(9) All "M" branded steers, which are recognized as potential rodeo and/or roping stock, being imported into Texas from another state shall obtain a permit, prior to entry into the state and be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection which indicates that the animal(s) were tested negative for tuberculosis within twelve (12) months prior to entry into the state.

#### C. Trichomoniasis Requirements

(1) All breeding bulls entering the state shall be virgin bulls not more than 24 months of age as determined by the presence of both permanent central incisor teeth in wear, or by breed registry papers; or be tested negative for Trichomoniasis with an official culture test or official Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test within 30 days prior to entry into the state.

Bulls that have had contact with female cattle subsequent to testing must be retested prior to entry. If the breeding bulls are virgin bulls, they shall be individually identified by an official identification device and be accompanied with a breeder's certification of virgin status signed by the breeder or his representative attesting that they are virgin bulls. The official identification number shall be written on the breeder's certificate.

All bulls tested for Trichomoniasis shall be identified by an official identification device or method at the time the initial test sample is collected. Official identification includes: Official alpha-numerical USDA metal eartags (bangs tags), Official 840 RFID tags, Official 840 flap or bangle tags, and Official

individual animal breed registry tattoo or breed registry individual animal brands, or Official state of origin Trichomoniasis tags.

The identification shall be recorded on the test documents or the breeder's certificate and the certificate of veterinary inspection prior to entry. Non-virgin bulls shall be tested three times not less than one week apart by official culture test or one time by official PCR test prior to entry into Texas.

(2) All bulls entering Texas for the purpose of participating at fairs, shows, exhibitions and/or rodeos, which are (12) months of age or older and capable of breeding may enter the state without testing or certification for trichomoniasis, but shall obtain a permit prior to entry into the state. Bulls permitted for entry into the State of Texas under the provisions of this subsection shall not be commingled with female cattle or used for breeding. Bulls that stay in the state more than sixty (60) days must be tested negative for trichomoniasis with an official culture test or official Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test.

#### D. Fever Tick Requirements

Cattle originating in a tick quarantined area must be accompanied by a certificate issued by an authorized representative of the Commission showing the cattle are free of infestation and exposure to fever ticks and have been dipped or treated under supervision in an approved dipping solution or treatment immediately prior to shipment.

#### E. Scabies Requirements

Cattle originating in a scabies quarantined area must be accompanied by an entry permit along with certification that the herd of origin is declared free of scabies or exposure to scabies and cattle have either been dipped with approved dip or injected with Ivermectin.

#### F. Screwworm Requirements

All animals presented for entry into Texas from any area in which the screwworm is known to exist must be free of screwworms and screwworm fly eggs. Wounds (infested or non-infested) must be treated with USDA approved screwworm killer and fly repellent. Animals other than lactating dairy animals and young animals under two weeks of age must be sprayed with a spray approved by the Executive Director.

### **7. Cattle Entering the State from Foreign Countries**

#### A. Brucellosis Requirements

Requirements for cattle from foreign countries without comparable brucellosis status that enter and remain in Texas:

(1) Permit Requirement. Sexually intact cattle must obtain an "E" permit prior to entry other than direct to slaughter or approved feedyard/pens. The permit number must be entered on the Importation Certificate (VS Form 17-30).

(2) Branding Requirements.

a. Sexually intact cattle destined for an approved feedyard/pen must be "S" branded prior to or upon arrival at the approved feedyard/pen.

b. Spayed heifers shall be identified by branding prior to entry.

(3) Vaccination Requirement. Nonvaccinated sexually intact female cattle between 4 and 12 months of age entering for purposes other than immediate slaughter or feeding for slaughter in an approved feedyard/pen shall be placed under quarantine on arrival and officially brucellosis vaccinated. The quarantine may be released after a negative test is conducted 30 days after they have had their first calf.

(4) Testing Requirements for Bulls entering for purposes other than immediate slaughter or feeding in an approved feedyard/pen. Bulls entering for purposes other than immediate slaughter or feeding in an approved feedyard/pen shall be tested at the port of entry into Texas under the supervision of the port veterinarian, and placed under quarantine and retested 120 to 180 days after arrival. The quarantine will be released following a negative brucellosis test.

(5) Testing Requirements for Females entering for purposes other than immediate slaughter or feeding in an approved feedyard/pen. All sexually intact female cattle entering for purposes other than immediate slaughter or feeding for slaughter in an approved feedyard/pen shall be tested at the port of entry into Texas under the supervision of the port veterinarian, and placed under quarantine on arrival and retested for brucellosis in no less than 120 days nor more than 180 days after arrival for release of the quarantine however, if the sexually intact female cattle have not had their first calf prior to the 120 to 180 day post entry test, the quarantine will not be released until a second negative test for brucellosis is conducted no sooner than 30 days after the animal has had its first calf and the second negative test has been confirmed.

(6) Testing Requirements for Sexually Intact Cattle moving directly to an approved feedyard/pen. All

sexually intact cattle destined for feeding for slaughter in an approved feedyard/pen must be tested at the port of entry into Texas under the supervision of the port veterinarian. These cattle must be "S" branded prior to or upon arrival at the approved feedyard/pen, and may move to the approved feedyard/pen only in sealed trucks with a VS 1-27 permit issued by a representative of TAHC or USDA personnel.

#### B. Tuberculosis Requirements

(1) All sexually intact cattle, from any foreign country or part thereof with no recognized comparable tuberculosis status:

a. To be held for purposes other than for immediate slaughter or feeding for slaughter in an approved feedyard/pen, must be tested at the port of entry into Texas under the supervision of the port veterinarian, and shall be under quarantine on the first premise of destination in Texas pending a negative tuberculosis test no earlier than 120 days and no later than 180 days after arrival. The test will be performed by a veterinarian employed by the TAHC or APHIS/VS.

b. When destined for feeding for slaughter in an approved feedyard/pen, cattle must be tested at the port-of-entry into Texas under the supervision of the port veterinarian; moved directly to the approved feedyard/pen only in sealed trucks; accompanied with a VS 1-27 permit issued by TAHC or USDA personnel; and "S" branded prior to or upon arrival at the feedyard.

(2) All other cattle from foreign countries, foreign states or zones within foreign countries defined by the Commission, with comparable tuberculosis status, would enter by meeting the requirements for a state with similar status as stated in subsections (1), (2) and (3) of the section: "Cattle Entering the State from Other States.

(3) Cattle originating from Mexico

a. All sexually intact cattle shall meet the requirements provided for in subsection (1) of this section.

b. Steers and spayed heifers from Mexico shall meet the federal importation requirements as provided in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Part 93, Section 93.427, regarding importation of cattle from Mexico. In addition to the federal requirements, steers and spayed heifers must be moved under permit to an approved pasture or to an approved feedyard/pen.

c. Cattle utilized as rodeo and/or roping stock shall meet the requirements set out in subsection (3) (a) of this section and the applicable requirement below:

(i) All sexually intact cattle shall be retested annually for tuberculosis at the owner's expense and the test records shall be maintained with the animal and available for review, or

(ii) All sexually neutered horned cattle imported from Mexico are recognized as potential rodeo and/or roping stock and must: (I) be tested for tuberculosis at the port of entry under the supervision of the USDA port veterinarian, and

(II) be moved by permit to a premise of destination and remain under Hold Order, which restricts movement, until permanently identified by methods approved by the Commission, and retested for tuberculosis between 60 and 120 days after entry at the owner's expense. The cattle may be allowed movement to and from events/activities in which commingling with other cattle will not occur and with specific permission by the TAHC until confirmation of the negative post entry retest for tuberculosis can be conducted, and

(III) be retested for tuberculosis annually at the owner's expense and the test records shall be maintained with the animal and available for review.

d. Regardless of reproductive status, test history, or Mexican state of origin, Holstein and Holstein cross cattle are prohibited from entering Texas.

e. All cattle moved into Texas from Mexico shall be identified with an "M" brand prior to moving to a destination in Texas.

f. A copy of the certificate issued by an authorized inspector of the USDA, APHIS, for the movement of Mexico cattle into Texas must accompany such animals to their final destination in Texas, or so long as they are moving through Texas.

C. Trichomoniasis Requirements (1) All breeding bulls entering from Mexico or from any country that does not have an established trichomoniasis testing program, shall enter on and be moved by a permit, issued prior to entry, from the commission, to a premises of destination in Texas and remain under Hold Order until tested negative for trichomoniasis with not less than three official culture tests conducted not less than seven (7) days apart, or an official Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test, within thirty (30) days after entry into the state. All bulls shall be maintained separate from female cattle until tested negative for trichomoniasis. The Hold Order shall not be released until all other post entry disease testing requirements have been completed. All bulls tested for trichomoniasis shall be

identified by an official identification device or method at the time the initial test sample is collected. The Identification shall be recorded on the test documents.

(2) All breeding bulls entering from Canada or from any country that has an established trichomoniasis testing program but for which the animals are not tested to meet the certification and testing requirements of subsection (C.) (1) "6. Cattle Entering the State from Other States" of this part, shall enter on and be moved by a permit, issued prior to entry, from the commission, to a premises of destination in Texas and remain under Hold Order until tested negative for trichomoniasis with not less than three official culture tests conducted not less than seven (7) days apart, or an official Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test within thirty (30) days of entry into the state. All bulls shall be maintained separate from female cattle until tested negative for trichomoniasis. All bulls tested for trichomoniasis shall be identified by an official identification device or method at the time the initial test sample is collected. The identification shall be recorded on the test documents.

## **8. Equine Entering the State**

A. All equine shall have a certificate of veterinary inspection and proof of a negative EIA test within the previous 12 months prior to entering Texas. The negative test results, together with the name of the laboratory conducting the test, must be shown on the certificate of veterinary inspection. Alternatively, a completed VS Form 10-11 may be attached to the certificate of veterinary inspection. Only test results from USDA approved laboratories are acceptable.

Exceptions to these test requirements:

- a. equine may enter Texas when consigned directly to a veterinary hospital or clinic for treatment or for usual veterinary procedures when accompanied by a permit number issued by the Commission. Following release by the veterinarian, equine must be returned immediately to the state of origin by the most direct route; or
- b. equine entering Texas for sale at a livestock market, may first be consigned directly to a veterinary hospital or clinic for issuance of the certificate of veterinary inspection and EIA testing, when accompanied by a prior entry permit issued by the Texas Animal Health Commission; or
- c. equine may enter Texas for shows, fairs, exhibitions or assembly purposes when accompanied by a valid equine interstate passport or equine identification card and a completed VS Form 10-11 showing negative results to an official EIA test within the previous six (6) months.
- d. foals, under eight months of age, accompanying and nursing a dam with a negative test within the last twelve months.

B. All equine must meet the same requirements for fever ticks and scabies as for "Cattle Entering the State from Other States".

C. Equine Viral Arteritis (EVA): Owners, shippers or exporters of EVA carrier stallions which are to be imported into Texas, shall notify the buyer or receiver of the stallion, in writing, prior to shipment into the state, that the stallion is an EVA carrier stallion. The equine shall be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection on which the carrier status of the stallion is notated.

## **9. Swine Entering the State**

A. A certificate of veterinary inspection is required for all but slaughter swine listing permanent identification and including a statement that they have not been fed garbage, have not been exposed to hog cholera or pseudorabies and have not been vaccinated for pseudorabies. Swine may be consigned direct to slaughter or a specifically approved market for sale to slaughter accompanied by a waybill in lieu of the certificate.

B. Leptospirosis vaccination is required on breeding swine, 6 months of age and over, within 30 days prior to entry with Leptospirosis vaccine containing the following strains: Canicola, Hardjo, Icterohaemorrhagiae, Grippotyphosa, Pomona.

C. A negative brucellosis test is required on breeding swine, 6 months of age and over, within 30 days prior to entry, if not originating from a validated brucellosis free herd or state or area.

D. Swine not known to be infected with or exposed to pseudorabies, and originate from a state not classified as Stage IV or V, may enter provided they:

- (1) are tested negative within 30 days prior to entry and then held in isolation and under quarantine on the premise where first unloaded and tested or retested for PRV in not less than 30 nor more than 60 days after arrival. Feeder swine are exempt from the retest provided that the swine enter on an entry permit from the Commission and are destined directly to an approved feedyard and remain restricted to the feedyard until they are sent to slaughter; or
- (2) originate from a qualified PRV negative herd; or

- (3) are shipped directly from a farm of origin in a Stage IV or free state or area as described in the National PRV Program; or
- (4) originate from and are sold at an approved feeder pig market in a Stage IV or free state or area and enter the state directly from that market.

#### **10. Sheep Entering the State**

A. A certificate of veterinary inspection is required on all imported sheep. All breeding sheep regardless of age, all sheep 18 months of age or older, and all sexually intact show or exhibition sheep, must be officially identified with a Scrapie Eradication Program eartag prior to entry. Animals originating from Inconsistent States (without an active scrapie surveillance and control program) may enter the State of Texas only if:

- (1) Obtain an entry permit, and
- (2) Consigned directly to a terminal feedyard, or
- (3) Consigned directly to slaughter.

B. All breeding rams, six months of age and over, must have had a negative ELISA test for brucella ovis within 30 days prior to entry or be from a brucella ovis free flock. Each ram shall be individually identified with an individual eartag or registration tattoo. This number, along with the test results and name of the approved laboratory and date of test, shall be entered on the certificate of veterinary inspection.

C. All blackface ovine females and all blackface crossbred females, except hair sheep, imported into the State of Texas for breeding purposes shall originate from a Scrapie Certified Free Flock or have documentation supporting that the animals are of the genotype RR at codon 171 or AA at codon 136 and QR at codon 171.

#### **11. Goats Entering the State**

A. A certificate of veterinary inspection is required on all imported goats.

B. All breeding or exhibition goats shall have official premises or approved USDA eartag in place and recorded on the certificate of veterinary inspection must be officially identified with a Scrapie Eradication Program eartag prior to entry, except registered goats with a registration tattoo and accompanied by registration papers. Animals originating from Inconsistent States (without an active scrapie surveillance and control program) may enter the State of Texas only if:

- (1) Obtain an entry permit, and
- (2) Consigned directly to a terminal feedyard, or
- (3) Consigned directly to slaughter.

C. All goats in slaughter channels shall have official premises or approved USDA eartag in place must be officially identified with a Scrapie Eradication Program eartag prior to entry, except goats that have not commingled with sheep.

#### **12. Poultry Entering the State**

A. A certificate of veterinary inspection and entry permit is required on poultry except poultry delivered to a slaughter establishment (which maintains federal postmortem inspection) by the owner or consigned there and accompanied by a waybill indicating the plant of destination.

B. Live domestic poultry, except those entering for slaughter and processing at a slaughter facility owned or operated by the owner of the poultry entering, may enter Texas only under the following circumstances:

- (1) The domestic poultry originate from a flock that is certified as Avian Influenza clean in accordance with the National Poultry Improvement Plan and the shipment is accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection; or
- (2) The domestic poultry is from an Avian Influenza negative flock that participates in an approved state-sponsored Avian Influenza monitoring program and the shipment is accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection indicating participation and listing the general description of the birds, test date, test results, and name of testing laboratory; or
- (3) The domestic poultry originate from a flock in which a minimum of 30 birds, 4 weeks of age or older, or the complete flock, if fewer than 30, are serologically negative to an Enzyme Linked Immunosorbent Assay (ELISA) or Agar Gel Immunodiffusion (AGID) test for Avian Influenza within 30 days of entry or a minimum of 10 birds (e.g. two pools of 5 birds per house) are tested negative on trachea swabs to a real-time reverse-transcriptase polymerase chain reaction (RRT-PCR) test within 30 days of entry or negative to other tests approved by the Commission; the shipment shall be

accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection listing the general description of the birds, test date, test results, and name of testing laboratory.

(4) Live domestic poultry from states affected with Avian Influenza may enter Texas for slaughter and processing only under the following circumstances: A minimum of 30 birds per flock are serologically negative to an ELISA or AGID test for Avian Influenza within 72 hours of entry, or a minimum of 10 birds (e.g., two pools of 5 birds per house) are tested negative on tracheal swabs to a RRT-PCR test within 72 hours of entry or negative to other tests approved by the TAHC, and specific written permission has been granted.

(5) Live domestic poultry broilers from states affected with Infectious Laryngotracheitis and vaccinated with chick embryo vaccine may enter Texas for immediate slaughter and processing only under the following conditions. The request for authorization to bring poultry into the state must be in writing and shall include a proposed route to slaughter that would not pose a disease risk to Texas poultry. The initial request must be approved by the Executive Director prior to entry of the poultry. All shipments of poultry qualifying for entry shall have an entry permit and documentation of the origin of the shipment.

C. Vaccination must be with vaccines approved by USDA and TAHC. (Contact TAHC for a list of approved vaccines.) NOTE: No modified live virus chick embryo origin Laryngotracheitis (LT) vaccine and no modified live virus mycoplasma gallisepticum (MG) attenuated vaccine may be used on poultry entering the State.

D. The certificate should state that the poultry have not originated from an area that has had active Laryngotracheitis within the last 30 days.

E. A negative pullorum-typhoid test is required within 30 days prior to entry or poultry must originate from flocks that meet either the Texas Pullorum-Typhoid Program and/or the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP).

F. Baby poultry are exempt from these requirements if from a NPIP or equivalent hatchery and accompanied by a NPIP VS Form 9-3 or an APHIS Form 17-6 or, are covered by an approved "Commuter Poultry Flock Agreement" on file with the state of origin and the Texas Animal Health Commission.

### **13. Exotic Livestock and Ratites Entering the State**

Exotic Livestock are defined as grass-eating or plant-eating, single-hooved or cloven-hooved mammals that are not indigenous to this state and are known as ungulates, including animals from the swine, horse, tapir, camel, llama, rhinoceros, elephant, deer, and antelope families.

Camelidae are defined as members of the family of animals which includes camels, lamas, and vicunas. The domestic members of the genus lama include the llama, alpaca, and guanaco.

Ratites are defined as exotic fowl with a flat breastbone and small or nonexistent wings, such as ostriches, emu, rheas, and kiwi.

Exotic bovidae means non-indigenous members of the family of animals which includes water buffalo, gnu (wildebeest), addax, antelope and nilgai (among others).

Exotic cervidae is further defined as non-indigenous members of the family of animals which includes deer, elk, moose, caribou, reindeer and the sub-family musk deer.

A. An entry permit and a certificate of veterinary inspection are required on all exotic livestock and ratites entering the state. The accredited veterinarian must state on the certificate that the exotic livestock and ratites have been inspected and are free of external parasites and evidence of contagious and communicable disease.

B. In addition to an entry permit and a certificate of veterinary inspection, exotic cervidae must originate from a certified free herd or be tested negative for brucellosis within 30 days prior to entry and meet the tuberculosis entry requirements as outlined in "Cervids Entering the State" (# 14.).

C. In addition to an entry permit and a certificate of veterinary inspection, exotic bovidae must be tested negative for brucellosis within 30 days prior to entry and negative to a tuberculosis test within 60 days prior to entry.

D. In addition to an entry permit and a certificate of veterinary inspection, exotic swine must be tested negative to pseudorabies and brucellosis within 30 days prior to entry or originate from a brucellosis validated free and pseudorabies qualified free herd.

E. In addition to an entry permit and a certificate of veterinary inspection, ratites must be;

(1) Individually identified with a RFID device, a permanently attached tag or an implanted electronic device (microchip). The identification will be shown on the certificate of veterinary inspection along with the location and name brand of the implanted electronic device. If an animal has more than one implanted microchip, then the location, microchip number, and name brand of each will be documented on the certificate of veterinary inspection; and

(2) Tested and found to be serologically negative for Avian Influenza and Salmonella pullorum-typhoid from a sample collected within 30 days of shipment. Birds or hatching eggs must originate from flocks that show no evidence of infectious disease and have no history of Avian Influenza in the past six months.

Ratites, destined for slaughter only, may enter accompanied by an entry permit and either a waybill or health certificate without meeting the testing or identification requirements.

#### **14. Cervids Entering the State**

A. All cervids entering the State must be accompanied by a certificate stating they were classified negative to two tuberculosis tests, which were conducted no less than 90 days apart; the second test was conducted within 90 days prior to the date of movement; and that the animals were isolated from all other members of the herd during the testing period, or;

(1) originate from an accredited free herd, or;

(2) originate from a qualified herd and have a classified negative 90-day tuberculosis test. If the qualifying herd test was administered within 90 days of movement, the animal(s) do not require an additional test, or;

(3) originate from a monitored herd and have a classified negative 90-day tuberculosis test, or;

(4) be less than 12 months of age, originate and were born in accredited, qualified, or monitored herds and have not been exposed to cervids from a lower status.

B. All cervidae entering Texas must meet the Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) Monitoring Program and entry permit requirements. Contact TAHC during business hours for information on the CWD requirements or read the full text of the Texas Administrative Code requirements at:

C. All mule deer and white-tailed deer are also required to obtain an entry permit from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD). (TPWD are prohibiting white-tailed and mule deer to enter Texas at the present time.)
